That is where we disagree. At what point do you believe that any human receives the right-to-life that makes destroying one a murder?

"Someone isn't going to go out and get an abortion because the stem cells of the fetus are going to help cure someones illness. Women get abortions for their own reasons."

This is not what I'm arguing against. What I'm saying is this (and this is a quote from a recent email I sent):

I would say that most people who oppose stem-cell research oppose it not because dead embryos are being used for research. They oppose it because

of what that dead embryo represents. They oppose it because to them it represents the exploitation of the body of the victim of a legalized, routine murder. Here's an analogy. (This analogy assumes that the reader believes that stealing is wrong.):

Let's say that you lived in a country that legalized bank robbery (as bizarre as that sounds), and that people still put money into the banks (as even more bizarre as that sounds). As a side note, in this country for as long as anyone could remember, bank robbery had been considered wrong, for whatever reason. So, a friend of yours robs a bank with his newfound liberty and decides to give the money to you. Now, you have a choice. You could undoubtedly do a great deal of good with that money, and the person giving it to you is doing a good thing by giving it away. So, if you really believed that bank-robbery (effectively stealing from other people) was wrong, would you accept that money? You're not doing the "wrong deed", but you're benefitting from someone who has. You're taking advantage of the wrong someone else has done. Those who oppose embryonic stem cell research are in the same position. By accepting it, they would not be doing the "wrong deed", but they would be benefitting from someone who did. They would be taking advantage of the wrong someone else has done. I believe that that is the primary reason that embryonic stem cell research on aborted embryos that would have been aborted anyway is still opposed. (I hope all that made sense. :-)

"Do you think that we should refrain from trying to find cures in this matter and accept the "fate" of an illness, when abortions are going to happen any ways?"

Simply put, I do believe that it is wrong to take advantage of the wrong-doing of others in that this goes beyond making the best of a situation caused by someone else's actions that are mutually agreed upon as wrong to effectively justifying the wrong of the abortions because they can be used to benefit other humans.

In addition, we could very well be focusing the same resources on other forms of stem-cell research that do not have the moral implications of embryonic stem-cell research, such as the adult stem-cell-research that I linked to in my original Discussion Post 2 post.

You guys bring up some good points, and have caused me to think a lot about what I believe on this. Personally, I believe that embryonic stem cell research as a whole is immoral, not in itself, but because of the destruction of unborn life behind it. For myself, I would draw the line as follows: I will continue to oppose the furtherance of embryonic stem cell research and the abortions and other destructions of life that it condones. I will not voluntarily allow myself to be treated with stem cells from a destroyed embryo, whether it was going to be aborted or not. I will, however, be willing to allow utilization of knowledge gained by this practice, insofar as my personal treatment does not directly involve the destruction of a human embryo. I still do not agree with those who promote future stem cell research, but I can see the argument for those who, while opposing it, are willing to use the biproduct (stem cells) of something they were unable to prevent (an abortion) to save human life. However, at this point, I, personally, would not do so. It is, admittedly, a complex consideration, given that the embryos were "going to be destroyed anyway."

However, let me clear up one apparent misunderstanding - I do not believe that my moral values should shift based on my physical circumstances. Do I sometimes allow the "foggier" ones to? Yes, but much to my dismay, and it is something that I continue to strive to rectify, as I believe that morals are not man's creation, but God's. But rest assured, those things that I am certain are immoral (e.g. cursing / denying God, murder, fornication, adultery, etc.) are things I would sooner die than do if faced with the choice. If you have trouble believing that anyone would die rather than "give up" his moral values, check out Foxe's Book of Martyrs, or take a look at the Christians who are still persecuted and even killed for their belief's in Sudan or China. Often all they have to do is say that they deny their faith - just their beliefs - and they would be freed, but they don't.
